

### Horticulture Happenings

#### Tips for repelling mosquitoes and the invasion of the jumping worms!


Our mild winter might have seemed pleasant at the time, but this spring and summer, we are likely to pay a price in terms of mosquito control challenges. Fortunately, we can get some assistance from some common plants. Peppermint, Basil, Sage, Catnip, Lavender, Marigold, Sage and Lemon Balm plantings are effective in repelling mosquitoes.

Here's a recipe for a natural repellent for personal use:

#### **Lavender Vanilla Mosquito Repellent**

- 15 drops of lavender essential oil.
- 3-4 Tbsp of vanilla extract.
- 3-4 Tbsp lemon juice.
- Distilled water.

Directions: Pour first 3 ingredients into an 8 oz spray bottle. Finish filling bottle with distilled water. Shake to combine ingredients Spray on skin or clothing.



Jumping worms are the new threat to northern forests! Jumping worms are non-native species that have become established in several eastern and southeastern states. These worms were confirmed for the first time in the Upper Midwest at the University of Wisconsin-Madison Arboretum in 2013 and have been spotted here. Jumping worms live in the topmost layer of the forest floor, among the fallen leaves. The threat this worm poses are that it eats organic material. The fallen organic material is what nourishes the forest floor and trees depend on the nutrients of fallen leaves. Jumping worms quickly turn the leaves into loose soil. The altered soil is unwelcoming to many native plant species.

The worms have an annual life cycle and can reproduce without fertilization. They die in the fall, but leave tiny cocoons that spend the winter in the soil. When we rake in the fall or mulch, the worms or cocoons are dispersed. Also, look for them in potted plants, on your clothes and garden equipment. At this time, there is no good control for them. If you spot one however, report it to the U of I extension or send a picture of it to plantclinic@illinois.edu
