Horticulture Happenings

Gina Ross, University of Illinois Extension Master Gardener, Winnebago County

Gardening trends this year will feature a true return to nature that focuses on flow, not fussiness, bringing nature indoors and out.

Where the wild thing are! Most gardeners are aware that bees and butterflies are in decline. Habitat loss and pesticides also affect birds, frogs and turtles. When planning and planting your garden, consider planting berry producing plants for the birds, and create some moist areas in the garden for the turtles and frogs. Balance Relax, the garden doesn't always have to be perfect. Allow your garden to flow and be flexible. Choose plants that look good, are easy to manage and provide food for pollinators. Native plants work well for this.

Forest Bathing The term comes from Japan where *shinrin-yoku*, forest bathing, just means visiting a forest or wooded area for a walk. At home, you can plant trees, shrubs and flowers along a path. In a woodland yard, create a walking path through the trees for a serene effect.

Cottage Gardens are usually low maintenance by nature, inviting a variety of wildlife, keeping it exciting yearround.

House Plants have never been more popular than now as people are finding more ways to engage in bringing nature inside. There are many plants to choose from for sunny rooms or to rooms with little light.

Purple is the color of 2018 and will show up in the home as well as the garden. I adore planting baskets with annual purple Black Knight salvia. This beautiful hummingbird magnet pairs well with orange and hot pink flowers for a fun, vibrant addition to any garden.

Rockford Rocks Sculpture A periodic column highlighting public sculptures in our city Lori Walsh

When you hear the name Leonardo, what famous person comes to mind? Leonardo Da Vinci, the artist and inventor? Leonardo De Caprio, the actor? Or possibly Leonardo, the Teenage Mutant Teenage Turtle (with no last name)? What about Leonardo Nierman? The name may not be familiar to you, but his Rockford sculpture most likely is. Located on the bike path north of the Auburn Street Bridge, his stainless steel sculpture "Flame" has brought a reflective beauty to this part of the path since its installation in 2005. The title of this dynamic piece leads the viewer to think about fire, which is a favorite subject of Niermans. Birds, wind, water, volcanic eruptions and lightning are other repeated topics in his work. Nierman's art can be found in more collections than any other living artist. He is an 82-year-old Mexican artist who has work in collections and museums around the world. "Flame" was donated to the city of Rockford by the Mexican government.

Like many artists, Nierman works in series. Perhaps you have noticed this sculpture near the Kennedy and Ohio interchange in Chicago; it repeats many of the rhythmic and curvaceous forms that Rockford's "Flame" uses. "Flame of the Millennium" 2002, Chicago



A multi-talented man, Leonardo Nierman holds degrees in math and physics from the University of Mexico and also trained as a violinist for two decades. The energy and vibrant colors of his paintings have led him to be referred to as the Jackson Pollock of Latin art.
