What annuals are recommended for an aroma in the garden?

One option for a fragrant plant:

Name: Paeonia lactiflora 'Sorcerer'
Zones: 3 to 8
Size: 3 feet tall and 2 feet wide
Conditions: Full sun; well-drained soil
Requiring little or no effort on the part of the gardener,
peonies consistently provide an abundance of blooms
every summer. 'Sorcerer' peony is one of the best
varieties. A vigorous grower, its dark red petals
surround a rich golden center. Although its sweet

fragrance is not as brash as many double-blossomed peonies, it is bold enough to have perfect strangers stop and comment on the scent as they walk past my garden. More important, when other multipetaled peonies are bowing over from early-summer storms, Sorcerer' stays erect on strong stems, and it seldom (if ever) requires any support.

Horticulture Happenings

Spring Flowering Bulbs

It's April, and there are signs of spring everywhere. Among of the most intriguing and beautiful signs of spring is the emergence of bulbs in their many varieties. They pop up so quickly!

Flower bulbs, which grow underground, store and protect the plant throughout the cooler seasons. In late winter or early spring, flower bulbs send up shoots of leaves and flowers for all to enjoy. The bulb has layers of leaves called scales that contain nutrients. Lateral buds around the base of the bulb develop into offsets called bulblets which can produce new plants.

The difference between bulbs and seeds is that a seed is an embryonic plant with a protective covering that stores food for the new plant until it can produce food on its own. A bulb is a mature plant structure, which is made of modified leaves, swollen at the base. The bulbs also store food until it goes through a period of dormancy.


Bulbs can be produced either from seeds or from offsets. When they are cultivated from seeds, it can take several years for a plant to form. This is because the bulb must develop first. Bulbs that are created from offsets often develop much more quickly.

This is accomplished by digging up older bulbs that have flowered already and splitting the offsets from the original bulb. The offsets are then planted, and once in the ground, develop into full flowering bulbs. Spring blooming bulbs, like tulips, daffodils and hyacinths are examples of bulbs that need to be planted in fall. These spring flowering bulbs must go through a chilling out period or experience winter temperatures so the following spring, they can send up shoots and blossom.

The flowers of tulips and daffodils will last several weeks and make good cut flowers. Once the flowers are spent they can be deadheaded, but the leaves need to stay put until they die back

Here are some interesting facts and folklore about tulips and daffodils;

- At one point in history, tulips were the most expensive flower. In the 1600s the flowers were more
 valuable than most people's homes, and cost almost 10 times what an average working-class man earned
 in a year.
- Tulips are edible! During World War II, tulips and tulip breads were often eaten by those who couldn't
 afford other foods. The flowers can be used to replace onions in many recipes and are even used to
 make wine.
- The Netherlands is the largest producer and exporter of tulips worldwide, growing and exporting nearly three billion bulbs each year.
- A bunch of daffodils offered as a gift ensures happiness and represents good fortune, while a single daffodil predicts misfortune
- Daffodils were a symbol of chivalry during Victorian times. Today, they are a symbol of hope.
- Ancient Romans cultivated daffodils and believed that sap extracted from the flowers possessed healing properties.



Impatiens – to plant or not to plant?

Impatiens are a staple plant found in many shady back yards and flower pots. If you have had a problem keeping your impatiens healthy the past couple of years, it most likely was due to a disease called Downy Mildew.

Downy Mildew tends to attack plants when the leaves remain wet and evening temps are cool. Impatiens leaves may turn yellow and drop from their stems. A white mold may develop on the underside of the leaves.

Watering Impatiens late in the day, especially by overhead watering poses a greater threat for development of Downy Mildew.
