

TRENDING IN 2023 GARDENS

March is that glorious time of year when we usher in spring with the vernal equinox, plan our gardens, watch as things start popping up in our yards...and pray the spring bulbs don't freeze when we get a big snow dump! Gardening for me has always been a bit relaxed, so when someone says "TREND," I cringe a bit. However, I'm thrilled to be a part of a few garden trends embracing change. The more you can make of your little piece of this earth, the better off we'll all be. Here are the top five trending this year:

Let's start with creating *habitats for pollinators*. Add native <u>flowers</u> and <u>trees</u> wherever you can and remove <u>invasives</u> whenever possible. Plant groupings of flowering plants that bloom from early spring through the end of fall. Include host plants for caterpillars, because if you don't feed the caterpillars, you will likely not have butterflies. (Herbs are great for this!) Limit the use of pesticides. (Again, let's not kill the pollinators.) With a healthy garden and the appropriate species of plants, things pretty much fall into place. Pollinators love scent and color. Butterflies are attracted to pink, purple, orange, red, and yellow while bees are attracted to blue, purple, and violet.

The *cottage garden* has returned with roses, lilacs, and hydrangeas in soft hues- all thanks to a popular Netflix series. I'm wondering where it went in the first place. True English cottage gardens are wild and diverse, interplanted with herbs, vegetables, and fruits. They celebrate chaos with color. Broccoli and Kale are stunning with Nasturtium and Chamomile. Red lettuces or basil make quite an attractive border. Roses love tomatoes! Let beans run on a trellis. Use your imagination and don't fuss, the possibilities are endless. Once established, your cottage garden can thrive with minimal care. Here are the top ten <u>plants</u> to attract pollinators to your cottage garden in zone five.

Cutting gardens have become quite popular. When preparing your space, don't forget to test your soil, test kits are available from the Extension Office. A few of zone five favorite flowers for sun and shade can be found <u>here</u> with tips.

Xeriscaping, What a great word! Creating water-efficient gardens. Well, HELLO!

Most people associate this with the gardens of Arizona and New Mexico, but a balanced landscape uses water efficiently and can cope with drought to minimize water waste. Experts say the best way to minimize water use is to reduce the size of your lawn and plant natives.

Tapestry lawns typically grow at about 4", and once established will need little maintenance... and they're "trending" now. They're a pollinator-friendly option which requires much less work than a typical turf lawn. Last year Americans spent \$30 billion dollars on turf grass, used an enormous amount of valuable water resources and polluted the earth with chemicals fertilizing their lawns. Turf grass was the number one irrigated crop, covering 40 million acres in the United States. Manicured lawns may soon become a thing of the past as homeowners are opting for lower maintenance *tapestry lawns*.

Whatever you decide to add to your garden this year, have fun and enjoy your piece of earth.
