LICHENS ONE OF THE OLDEST ORGANISMS ON EARTH

hose fuzzy growths on trees and rocks—are they lichens, mosses, or algae? The terms are not inter-

changeable. Each term refers to a separate organism. Mosses are singular organisms; lichens are composites. Only mosses are plants. Mosses are believed to be the ancestors of the plants we see today. Lichens on the other hand are not similar in any way to mosses or other members of the plant kingdom. Lichens are completely different. They do not have any roots, stems or leaves and their chloroplasts are contained only in the algae on the top surface of the lichen. A lichen is formed when fungi and algae (or cyanobacteria) enter into a symbiotic partnership. The alga provides nutrients and the fungus provides a body for the alga. Lichens are everywhere. There are around 15,000 species and one can find them in alpine regions, in intertidal zones, on the sides of old buildings and even on rotting clothes. As a primary colonizing species in most environments, lichens influence soil formation through a process of decomposition which helps create the right conditions for other organisms to occupy the area. Lichens are slow growing, expanding by millimeters even in years of favorable conditions.

Lichens are often keystone species: They provide food for some animals and shelter for others. They protect trees in inclement conditions. Because lichens enable algae to live all over the world in many different climates, they also provide means to convert carbon dioxide in the atmosphere through photosynthesis into oxygen which we all need to survive. Ranging from small clusters to vast, fiber-like tendrils, lichens benefit humanity by their ability to absorb everything in their atmosphere, especially pollutants. Any heavy metals (such as cadmium), carbon, sulfur, or other pollutants are absorbed into the lichen body. Scientists can extract these toxins and determine the levels that are present in our atmosphere. Science is just beginning to understand their capacity for renewal.

There are about 3,600 lichen species in North America. The US Forest Service National Lichens and Air Quality Database and Clearinghouse helps federal land managers assess the ecological impacts of air pollutants using lichen data. Map lichen (Rhizocarpon geographicum) in the Arctic is believed to be about 8,600 years old, making it one of the oldest organisms on earth. As essential as they are, lichens are also just fun and beautiful to look at.

Committee Reports

Awards - Elaine Parrovechio - Had no Report.

Civic Conservation - Diane Donze reported that she gets emails from Habitat, and they are in the midst of the summer construction season. Habitat purchased 31 lots in back of Auburn High School for \$31,000, and they will be building there over the next four to five years. The approved homeowner will get a 0% mortgage. Those working on a house include a master carpenter, volunteers, and the new homeowner. Diane said that there is a lot going on.

Programs - Arch Smith reported that we had the Flanary Garden Tour on June 11. Arch has ordered two gifts for the Flanarys, and they should be ready soon. Around 120 people attended the tour. Each tour had approximately 60 people. Past tours or events had: 75 members for the Fall Frolic, 120 for the Behr Garden Tour, 60-65 for the Christmas Sedona event, 85 at the Belvidere Barn event, and now 120 for the Flanary Garden Tour. Arch reported that CRG events average 92.5 members. Arch reported that he has a couple of gardens in mind for next year and the following year. Diane Donze is helping secure Mary Ann Smith's garden for next year's tour. Next, Arch asked whether or not members wanted a Christmas or Holiday CRG gathering or event? The Garden Walk promotion cards have been delivered to the local garden centers. The garden reps are getting greeters. Five of the photo shots of the gardens are done, and Mary Stanton is working on the seven garden stones. Benson Stone donated the stones. Arch is doing a 15-20 minutes power point presentation to the Kiwanis Club regarding the Garden Walk.

Horticulture - Pat Bellezza - Had no Report. CRG agreed that Pat is doing a beautiful job.

Hospitality - **Bev Larson** requested that members please respond to her as to whether or not you will be attending. Arch reminded Bev that we do not have a meeting in August, and the CRG September meeting will be on September 9 since September 2 is Labor Day.

Parliamentarian - Sarah Britton reported that "all the seats are filled".


